


## **PPA Futures**

- Funded by the Linden Trust for Conservation
- In collaboration with IUCN
- Process: Global review of Private Protected Areas (PPAs)
- Outcome: Understanding the opportunities, constraints, incentives and disincentives for PPA development
- ▶ Aim: Enabling environment globally and nationally leading to the increased designation and strengthening of PPAs



## Research



Increase in research papers on PPAs over time

- ▶ 17 country reviews of PPA status
- Literature review of existing research
- Expert meetings
- Calls for information/conferences



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# Why PPAs?


- Protected since 1970s but not officially recorded
- One of the most popular nature conservation sites owned and managed by NGOs and their supporters in Wales
- Important for connectivity between national park, nature reserve and other PPAs
- Ecosystem service: floodplain
- Biodiversity: wide range of habitats and species
- Education: local and national



## Global under reporting


- Canada: "no comprehensive information regarding private protected areas across the country"
- Australia: "The national reporting of private protected areas is somewhat more ad hoc and is not comprehensive"
- Germany: "There is no central database of PPAs"
- Kenya: "As yet there is no centralised database covering all types of PA"





# **Understanding PAs**

- IUCN has spent the last two decades reviewing the question of what defines a "protected area"
- Created a common language for understanding PAs across the globe, through the IUCN PA definition, six management categories and governance types
- Developed a series of global guidance documents



# **Reporting PAs**

- IUCN and UNEP WCMC have been recording the global PA estate since the 1960s
- Mandate from the UN and latterly the CBD
- Reporting has focused on information provided by governments
- The reporting standard for the World Database on Protected Areas is the IUCN definition, categories and governance types



## PA definition

- The definition of a protected area: A clearly defined geographical space, recognised, dedicated and managed, through legal or other effective means, to achieve the longterm conservation of nature with associated ecosystem services and cultural values
- Six categories of management approaches and four governance types



## Governance

- Who has responsibility and is held accountable for decisions about a given protected area?
- A. the government (and its agencies at various levels)
- B. various parties (comanagement)
- c. owners of the concerned land and natural resources (private individuals, corporate actors...)
- indigenous peoples and local communities




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
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# **Importance**

- "While private lands cover a relatively small portion of the overall land base, they may be disproportionately important in terms of protecting biological diversity"
- \*There is a broad consensus that private protection has a key role to play in biodiversity conservation"
- "Private protected areas have an important role to play in securing land of high biodiversity importance"







## Global under reporting

- Reviewing 10 of the 17 PPA Futures reviews received so far has identified over 11,000 PPAs
- Far more than identified on the WDPA
- And there are many more thousands in Europe, US, etc not included in this figure




#### Australia


- National protected area databases don't adequately account for PPAs
- ~5,000 terrestrial properties that could be considered PPAs in Australia covering 8.5 million hectares

## Chile: over a million ha not reported







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# **Understanding PPAs**

- We need to develop broad global understanding of key PPA issues
- PPA Futures Project currently looking at three key issues relating to:
- Terminology the word "private"
- Definition how to apply IUCN definition to PPAs
- Recognition different ways in which countries recognise PPAs



# **Terminology**

- the name "private protected area" is problematic to some because it suggests that such areas are exclusive; in fact private protected areas are often public space managed by NGOs etc.
- Privately Managed PAs might be a better option?



## **Definition**

- PPA should always be linked to long-term conservation intent
- Intent should transcend change of ownership (through easement, covenant, wills, government legal processes re PA legislation etc)
- Can we develop global guidance on understanding "intent" which can be adapted and applied nationally?



## **Definition**

- PPAs should have stated conservation objectives
- Management effectiveness assessment and systems of verification can help ensure achievement of objectives and evidence of conservation success
- Do we need to develop specific assessment systems for PPAs?



# Recognition

- Some countries include PPAs in legislation (e.g. Brazil)
- In others, networks, associations, or organisations of PPAs collect data (e.g. Chile)
- IUCN and conservation NGOs can also be information providers (e.g. IUCN National Committee UK)
- Do we need to develop a verification process for data providers – through IUCN WCPA?

- Convention on Biological Diversity 11<sup>th</sup> Conference of Parties in Korea
- Information paper on PPAs circulated by IUCN (or from the CBD Secretariat)
